Art



Throughout the school there has been a focus on painting and printing this term. Alongside this children have carried on with their drawing and sketching skills.

The children have really enjoyed creating their own pieces of art using paint and exploring in different techniques to print.

Art has been widely used throughout many of the different curriculum's especially in science, topic and Religious Education this term, which has been great to see that children are using art in many lessons.

Children have had opportunities to use a wide range of resources for painting including watercolours. This was thanks to our CPD training in painting where teachers and teaching assistants were taught different techniques, this has now been used across the school in various lessons.

They have been exploring in adding white and black to colours to make tints and tones in their work.

Children have begun to start to explore the different techniques of printing from using foam blocks to using shaving foam to produce different prints! They are looking forward to seeing where their journeys in printing takes them.





Computing



Key Stage 1

This term, children have been focusing on developing their Information Technology skills. In Year 1, the children have been exploring how to take clear photos on the iPads. They have been looking closely at portrait, landscape and zooming in to focus on different shots. In Year 2, they have been using typing skills to explore their topic 'Sensational Safari' using Google Docs. Every child has learnt how to save their work and download images!

Key Stage 2

In KS2 this term, children have been completing their first coding units on Espresso as well as discussing online safety during Digital Literacy lessons.

Lower Key Stage 2

In Year 3, they have typed up some of their topic writing as part of their 'Oceans and Rivers' topic. In Year 4, as well as using the Micro:bits to code a bird counting monitor during Science Week, Year 4 classes have been discussing 'Life Vs Technology' during digital literacy. They have created comic book strips of when technology gets in the way of real life experiences.

<u>Upper Key Stage 2</u>

Year 5 have been continuing with their coding unit on Espresso creating code with multiple inputs and outputs. They have also been discussing sharing beliefs and opinions online. In Year 6, they have been discussing strategies to limit the impact of technology on their health.








Reading

This term, we have loved sharing some fantastic stories with the children. We were really excited to be visited by the Cornwall Library Service's Library Bus and each class has enjoyed reading a selection of carefully chosen texts from this service. In EYFS and KS1, the children have been continuing to build their comprehension skills, reading expression and fluency. It was great to be able to share the teaching of Early Reading and Phonics with Parents/Carers on our Bedtime Stories evening. In KS2, the children have enjoyed whole class guided reading sessions which have seen them read a range of fiction, non-fiction and also news extracts.

World Book Day

We saw a fantastic return to World Book Day this year! It was a pleasure to see the children come together in a celebration of all things reading. Each class seized the opportunity to dress as their favourite book characters and complete a range of fantastic book-themed activities.

Writing

Throughout this term, each class has continued to use their class topics as a stimulus for their writing. We have been working hard to continue the development of the children's writing; providing exciting opportunities to communicate their ideas. From writing about how to care for animals, creating their own Greek Myths and adapting Cornish tales, the children have produced some fantastic pieces of writing this term.

Shakespeare Week

Phonics



Nursery

In Nursery the children have continued to build on their *Foundations for Phonics*. They have enjoyed sharing a range of high-quality stories and poems. The children have particularly enjoyed The Very Hungry Caterpillar and have impressed the Nursery staff with their use of vocabulary when discuss this story. It has been lovely to listen to the children share their growing repertoire of nursery and action rhymes as they learn their Nursery Rhyme of the Week. Our Nursery children have also enjoyed a range of activities such as *Our Sound Box*, which help to develop focused listening and attention which will support oral blending.




Reception

Our Reception children have been introduced to the Phase 3 phonemes this term. They have enjoyed learning the catchphrases for each of the taught digraphs (2 letters making 1 sound) and trigraphs (3 letters making 1 sound) e.g. 'ai-tail in the rain' and 'igh-a light in the night.' The children are now practising applying their phonic knowledge to write simple sentences and are doing a fantastic job of holding a sentence in their head for writing.



Year 1

Year 1 have continued to 'Grow the Code.' They are continuing to build their knowledge of the alphabetic code, that is the relationship between the sounds that can be identified in speech (phonemes) and the letters used to represent them in writing (graphemes). This has seen them look at alternative spelling of a phoneme e.g. /l/ as in 'lolly' and 'le' as in 'apple.' The children are getting very quick at correctly saying the alternative pronunciations for graphemes during our Phonics flashcard 'Shuffle Time.'

Dy'Gol an Mammow Lowen!


All children in KS1 and KS2 enjoyed a fantastic Science Show as part of British Science Week this term where they found out all about sustainable energy. This learning then continued into class.

Geography



Mapwork is an ongoing focus in geography across the school. EYFS have developed their map making skills and created their own maps of their outside space. The children have followed these maps in order to plant bulbs in the correct places in the Early Years outside area.

Year 2 have continued their mapwork skills with a particular focus on weather patterns. Children have recapped on continents with a focus on Africa. The children extended their learning with an exciting trip to Newquay Zoo, identifying animals from around the world.

Each year group have thoroughly enjoyed investigating a geographical question this term as part of the 'Connected Geography' scheme. Year 3's big question was, 'Beyond the Magic Kingdom'; investigating what the 'Sunshine State' is really like.

Year 4 have answered the question, 'Why are jungles so wet and desserts so dry?' In Year 5, they have researched the importance of mountains, whilst Year 6 have looked at the affects of 'Climate Change'.



History



Each year group have thoroughly enjoyed immersing themselves into their history topics this term. Classes have investigated local history as well as learning about history around the world.

EYFS children have investigated the history of their local area, comparing photographs from the present day and the past. They have also enjoyed completing a study of China; comparing and contrasting images from China and England. Great fun was also had building the Wall of China!

Year 3, have enjoyed completing a local history study of 'Carlyon Bay'. Whilst Year 5 have studied a range of artifacts from Ancient Greece to uncover clues about their daily life. Year 6, have studied 'continuity and change' as part of their local history study of Cornish history; sequencing key events in Cornish history and the achievements of Richard Trevithick.



Maths



It is our aim at Sandy Hill to boost enjoyment and enthusiasm for maths, build confidence in maths knowledge and use these skills to have an ability to reason mathematically and explain answers using mathematical language.

This term, the children in the EYFS have continued their exploration of number. They have learnt how to create number sentences using double facts. There are opportunities for children to embed their learning during free flow activities.

This term, across Key Stage One, children have continued to focus on deepening their understanding of number with a unit on multiplication and division. In addition to this, children have been working practically on their measuring skills. We use a variety of teaching and learning styles in our maths lessons to achieve our overall aim to develop children's knowledge and skills of maths.

In Key Stage Two, we started off the term with a unit on multiplication and division. This has prepared us brilliantly for a unit on fractions. It was great to see mathematics being used during Science week to report our findings a variety of ways.

Each day, we have dedicated time focusing on the children's fluency and mental arithmetic. In Key Stage One children have continued working through the number sense scheme which is increasing the fluency of children with number recognition along with addition and subtraction. Key Stage Two children have a dedicated thirty minute arithmetic session to improve mental recall and build on prior learning. Throughout the term, children have been beating their own previous best scores and we now have many children scoring top marks consistently on their papers. Year 4 have been working incredibly hard on their times tables in preparation for the multiplication check. All classes have participated in 'Battle Of The Bands' tournaments on Rockstars!


Key stage two have continued with Spanish this term. It has been great to see their confidence grow the over the past two terms and show super resilience and self-motivation in their Spanish learning.

Spring term has been a busy term for music in Sandy Hill... it has been wonderful to hear music fill the school again! From African drumming in year 2, to exploring sound and notation in Reception, to in year 6, this term has been musical! Year 4 have enjoyed taking part in First Access, where they have learned to play the ukulele with the wonderful Mrs Man. The children have enjoyed learning how to care for the instrument, and to play different chords.

Our Rocksteady bands have been performing a wide range of songs including sea shanties, heavy metal and rock tunes! Their end of term performance was truly fantastic, and was a wonderful opportunity for the children to showcase all they have been learning in their weekly sessions.

The children in year 2 had fun learning a traditional Kenyan welcoming song called 'Jambo Bwana' which gives a message of positivity and of challenging our worries.

In Nursery, the children have really enjoyed their focus nursery rhyme 'I'm a Little Teapot'. The children have done a brilliant job at learning the words and copying the actions to this song. The children have also been learning to sequence this nursery rhyme so they know what words come next!

Oracy



The children in all year groups have been really excited to continue to develop their Oracy skills within our curriculum!

This term, our focus Oracy skill is Cognitive Oracy. Cognitive Oracy skills include clarifying, summarising and reasoning our speech and communication.

At Sandy Hill Academy we use our newly gained Oracy skills to support our speech and communication during times outside of lessons in class too. Our School Parliament and Eco Council have been learning to adapt their Oracy skills for different audiences - sharing their thoughts and ideas to have a positive impact on the school community.

In our Nursery and Reception classes, The Nuffield Early Language Intervention (NELI) is a programme used to support Oracy skills in the Early Years. This programme intervention is delivered to support improving children's vocabulary, developing narrative skills, encouraging active listening and building confidence in independent speaking.

The children have enjoyed exploring new Oracy skills and techniques this term to enable them to become inspiring speakers and effective communicators.

Keeping our bodies and minds healthy are essential to school life. Physical Education, Physical Activity and School Sport helps us do this.

During the school day at Sandy Hill, children are consistently encouraged to be as active as possible. For example, in Maths, the children play different games such as 'Squat You Know' where they work with a partner and take it in turns to squat a certain times table one after the other. It is of paramount importance that the children are inspired by us to lead a healthy and active lifestyle as this not only impacts their bodies, but also their emotional and social wellbeing.

As always, we have two main areas in PE: the overall lesson learning objective and a Star/Planet Value which develops personal attributes. In Key Stage Two, we have submerged ourselves in the world of football and communication which has worked brilliantly as they go together side by side. The children have learnt to play as a team and that communication plays a huge part when playing in a game-based situation. Key Stage One have also been learning about football and ball skills. On top of this, they have been learning gymnastics. The children have been able to switch from lesson to lesson to learn new things that will enable them to grow as a sportsperson.

All year groups have been developing their understanding of 'Keeping Myself Safe' and 'Rights and Responsibilities' through role-play, story telling, scenarios and many more 'lively' debates and discussions - raising their awareness of feeling safe and maintaining a healthy lifestyle.

EYFS have been exploring a range of healthy foods through taste and smell, describing ways they can keep themselves healthy and talking about how keeping clean can help our bodies. The children have been learning about the importance of being kind and a good friend.

Key Stage 1: through lots of class discussions have been identifying situations which they feel safe and unsafe. They have described and recorded strategies for how to get on with others in the classroom and playtime environment. Under the umbrella of 'Keeping Safe', the children have created worry dolls to express feelings and to learn about sleep patterns.

In **Key Stage 2**, the children have grappled with stereotyping (including online) and the importance of safety in a digital world. Within 'Rights and Responsibilities' lessons. the children have cemented their understanding of digital platforms and age restrictions, as well as understanding the impact of media influence.



RE - Religious Education



Children across the school have been enjoying exploring what people believe and the difference this makes to how they live and using this to reflect on their own ways of living.

The children have been provided with opportunities to ask questions about the faiths they have been learning about. They have explored different beliefs through a variety of activities including storytelling, drama, poetry and art.

In Reception the children have enjoyed learning about The Story of Easter. They listened to the story and discussed the meaning of the story and

messages for Christians and exploring the question of Why is the Word 'God' important to Christians. In Year 1 the children have been exploring the question "Who is Jewish and how do they live?" As part of this they listened to the story of Hanukkah and created their own Shema's and Mezuzah's.

In Year 2 the children retold the story of Easter and explored the ideas within the story to help answer the question "Why does Easter matter to Christians?"

In Year 3 the children have been exploring the question " How do festivals and family life show what matters

to Jewish people? As part of this they have looked at Yom Kippur the 'day of atonement'. The children then made their own Shofar.

In Year 4 the children investigated the question "How and why do people in Cornwall mark significant events in community life? As part of this they learnt about Saint Piran's day which we also celebrated as a whole school.

Science



Spring Term has been full of amazing Science happening across the whole school and it is exciting to see so many keen scientists asking questions and making observations of the world around us.

<u>Science Week</u>

Science Week got off to an exciting start with a visit from Coppice Theatre who delivered an amazing Science Theatre show. We all learnt so much about natural sources of energy, different types of scientist and how everyone can become a scientist! We were all buzzing and inspired to launch into Science week.

Children in EYFS enjoyed some exciting investigations. Exploring giant bubbles, identifying plants and animals in our school grounds, creating coloured plants and observing chemical reactions! Lots of wow moments!

Children across KS1 deepened their learning on Animals and their habitats. Year 1 enjoyed a visit to Penrice Academy Farm and Year 2 visited Newquay Zoo. In addition the children enjoyed a variety of investigations exploring our senses and making observations of micro-habitats in the school grounds. Year 2 really enjoyed learning about the work of scientist Marianne North and created a piece of art in the style of one of her paintings.

KS2 carried out some amazing science work throughout the week. Year 4 using microbit bird monitors to record different birds visiting our school grounds and worked hard to create classification keys for plants and animals. Year 3 had brilliant fun investigating friction and taking part in the 'jelly chopstick' challenge. Year 5 investigated air resistance through a paper aeroplane challenge and Year 6 enjoyed making close observations using the microscopes.

The week was a brilliant opportunity to apply and build on all of the brilliant science learning happening throughout the year!


















Cultural Capital

EYFS - Early Years Foundation Stage



In Early Years, we have been working on the 'dispositions' for learning, understanding the skills needed to be a successful learner. We have been teaching and modelling: resilience, motivation, metacognition. We have encouraged the children to question and problem solve when faced with challenges.







The children have recently had the opportunity to attend 'Bedtime Stories', it was a magical evening wearing our pyjamas listening to our favourite stories, snuggled up with our teddies. It was a great opportunity for parents to attend our 'Reading and Phonic' workshop.

The Teenage Brain. Did you know?


Scientists used to believe that teenagers' brains were fully formed, like adult brains, and that the key stage of human brain development took place before the age of three. They are now discovering that teenage brains are going through a period of surprisingly complex and crucial development, with grey matter expanding hugely around puberty and then thinning down again. In particular the frontal lobes, the parts of the brain which help us to be mature, to plan ahead and resist impulses, go through an extraordinary state of growth and reorganisation in early adolescence and may not settle to a fully mature state until we are in to our twenties!

This obviously has huge implications for how we treat and educate children and indeed teenagers; if they seem unable to organise themselves, make sensible decisions, or be capable of abstract thought, we can put some of this down to the fact their frontal lobes are still developing, so we need to be patient with them and give them time.
